

Socrates


- ~469 399 BCE

Plato


- ~428 348 BC
- Student of Socrates
- Theory of Ideas
- Society to meet needs
- Justice to avoid oppression
- Constant legal reform
- Gender equality

- 384 322 BCE
- Student of Plato
- Property shared but owned by individuals
- Pride of ownership
- Pleasure of sharing or giving away
- Society to respect rights

- 1266 1308
- John of Dunse
- Natural tendency to pursue happiness
- Natural tendency to pursue justice
- Freedom is the power to weigh the two

Intermission for Reformation (more Free Will vs. Determinism)

John Locke

- 1632 1704
- Humans are naturally free and equal
- Right to property earned by labour
- Society gains security at the cost of some liberty
- Government can enforce property rights better than individual

- 1694 1778
- François-Marie Arouet
- Scientific and social progress
- Civil rights, protest abuses by governments

David Hume


- 1711 1776
- Benevolence natural only in close relation
- Justice a convention
- Property rights most important
- Good of stable society

Jean-Jacques Rousseau


- 1712 1778
- Natural state freedom to follow desires, no property
- Society for the purpose of progress
- Side-benefits of property and protection

Thomas Paine


- 1739 1809
- Natural state all property is common
- Private property arose for agriculture, necessary but not good
- Tax as a payment for the right to hold property
- Those with property provide for needs of humanity

Georg Wilhelm Friedrich Hegel


- 1770 1831
- Free self-actualization
- Limited by social institutions, or empowered by the state
- Rights, exercise individual choice
- Life, freedom from slavery, property

Thomas Hill Green

- 1836 1882
- State should intervene only to protect liberty
- Promote moral development of individual


Intermission for Capitalism vs. Socialism/Communism

Software as Property

- Initially a "utilitarian good", not protected as property
- Copyright registrations granted under "rule of doubt"
- 1974, Commission on New Technological Uses of Copyrighted Works (CONTU)
- 1976, Bill Gate's Open Letter to Hobbyists
- 1980, "computer program" added to US Copyright law

- born 1953
- Four Software Freedoms
- Copyleft
- Benefit to users

Four Freedoms

- Use
- Study and Modify
- Redistribute
- Redistribute modified versions

Copyleft

- Software is property
- Developer owns software, product of their labour
- Developer grants four freedoms
- Any who benefit from freedoms, also required to grant freedoms

Software Freedom

- 1982, Symbolics vs. Lisp Machines, Inc.
- 1983, GNU Manifesto published, GNU Project started
- 1985, Free Software Foundation launched
- 1987, GCC GPL released
- 1989, GPLv1 released
